## **Clues:**

- 1. The Bunsen burner is not stained with milk.
- 2. Isaac has a black tail.

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- 3. Marie does not have white paws.
- 4. Of the cat that threw up and the one that sabotaged the Bunsen burner, one has green eyes and the other one has pointed ears.
- 5. The Erlenmeyer flask was dropped.
- Niels, the black-tailed cat, and the one who damaged the microscope are three different cats.
- 7. Isaac, the green-eyed cat, and the one involved in the Geiger counter incident are three different cats.
- 8. The cat with pointed ears is not guilty of the act of mischief on the Geiger counter.
- 9. Of Max and the black-tailed cat, one scratched an object and the other one sabotaged the Bunsen burner.
- 10. Either Albert has long fur and the green-eyed cat dropped an object, or Albert has pointed ears and the white-pawed cat dropped an object.
